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## **Engineering Controls**

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# 11. Toxicological Information

#### Summary

IF SWALLOWED: may cause irritation, nausea, stomach pains and/or vomiting.

IF IN EYES: May cause irritation of the eyes. Zinc sulphate: May cause blurred vision and serious eye damage. Visual disturbances, including blurred vision.

IF ON SKIN: May cause irritation of the skin. Skin contact will cause redness, itching and swelling. Repeated exposure may cause skin dryness and cracking and may lead to dermatitis. May cause an allergic skin reaction.

IF INHALED: dusts may cause irritation of the respiratory tract.

CHRONIC TOXICITY: repeated exposure may be harmful to kidneys (cobalt compounds), heart and pancreas. Cobalt sulphate may damage fertility and is suspected carcinogen. Repeated exposure to Copper compounds may be harmful to the kidneys.

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Acute Oral Using LD<sub>50</sub>'s for ingredients, the Acute Toxicity Estimate (ATE) (oral) for the mixture is

between 300 and 2,000 mg/kg. Data considered includes: zinc sulphate 926mg/kg (mouse), copper glycinate 1200mg/kg (rat), Cobalt Sulphate Heptahydrate 330mg/kg

(sheep).
